motherhood in Mityana. We have developed a family planning strategic plan for Mityana district. And this is the first of this kind in Uganda." Rev Moses is the Health Coordinator, Mityana Diocese Church of Uganda.

Betty Akullo, Lira northern Uganda is a midwife. "I used to think that if I deliver many women I would end maternal deaths. I joined this program to learn what role I could play to end this. My

research was on teenage pregnancies in Abako Sub-county, Lira. I held dissemination meetings at the sub-county to share my findings. In Feb 2019 Plan International started a Stop teenage pregnancy and early marriage program in response to my research."


Susan Nangami, Jinja: I am a midwife. I didn't know why mothers were dying and that I could do something about it. Now I know."

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A focus on fourth delay at Panyimur Health Centre

Jimmy Oryem, STM alumnus graduated on 2 March 2018.
Oryem is a senior clinical officer and the in-charge of Panyimur Health Centre 3, Pakwach, west Nile, Uganda.

Since taking on this leadership role in 2017, Oryem has made great strides in improving service delivery in maternal health to address the fourth delay. Milestones Oryem celebrates include installation of solar lights in the maternity ward thus saving midwives from using mobile phone light during night deliveries.

He has also advocated for more midwives from one in 2017 to now

five health workers who can handle deliveries.



"We have four delivery beds. The facility had one bed for so long."

Oryem says: "I have managed to achieve these milestones through lobbying, advocacy, mobilsation, networking and leadership skills that I acquired during the STM-MPHL program."

A walk with midwives

Midwifery, leadership & communication skills

In March 2019 Save the Mothers conducted the second Midwifery Mentorship and Coaching (MMC). It gathered 23 midwives from 10 big hospitals in Uganda: Kagando, Nakaseke, Mubende, Mityana, Kawolo, Nagaalama, Jinja, Tororo, Mbale hospitals and Mukono Health Centre 4.

These hospitals are under Save the Mothers outreach arm of Mother Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative (MBFHI).

The five days mentorship took place in March 2019, at Crested Crane Hotel, Jinja eastern Uganda. It focused on midwifery, leadership and communication skills that were shared through presentations and field visit to Jinja Regional Referral hospital.

Dr Eve Nakabembe, Director MBFHI was the lead facilitator and organiser of the training. Cofacilitators were Dr J Barageine, Dr E Mukooza, Sr A Lubega and T Agutu. C Namono and E Gumisiriza provided support.

The event was closed by Dr Miriam Mutabazi, Director Save the Mothers East Africa and Deborah Mensah, Executive Director, STM International presented certificates to participants.



STM has trained 50 midwives under MMC. The first MMC was in April 2018 in Mityana for 27 midwives.
